Mobile Alabama First Light Marathon Trip Notes <u>January 9-12, 2009</u>

Why run Mobile Alabama's First Light Marathon? If you like

- small marathons where you can walk out your hotel at 7:20 and start promptly at 7:30.
- lovely old Southern homes.
- inexpensive entry fees -- \$32 with 50-states discount.
- high tech shirts even styled for women.
- inexpensive yet comfortable hotel.
- friendly southerners who really want you to like their town.
- historically significant and interesting locations.
- adding another state to your 50-state belt and a Southern Bell charm to the charm necklace.
- difficult and challenging course with plenty of major hills.
- food at most water stops, and early in the race with back of the pack still obtaining oranges and bananas.
- post race food was a full meal.
- free pasta dinner pre race.
- giveaways and freebies at expo better than some big time marathons.

Why not choose Mobile's Marathon? If you don't like

- no chip and limited number of time clocks.
- Massage closing down after 5 hours.
- some streets without spectators.
- a bit of concrete and some rough surfaces.
- a second half of the marathon course with only 370 runners in total.
- small airport resulting in indirect flights.

Results: Maricar came in at 5:16 and I came in at 5:26 with a few behind me. #325 of 371 and 2nd in my age group out of 5. I was very happy and wasn't sure I deserved that after being on 'rest' for so long, but taking it easy paid off and there appears to be no injuries and no soreness which surprised me.

<u>Touring:</u> We were lucky beyond dreams. While in Paris, sitting at a restaurant in the Louvre, we met a nice looking 40ish guy with his son. They were on a 17 day European tour. Accents made for the usual question of domicile and we found Richard Powell was from Mobile. Richard offered his number, insisted we call, and Southern Hospitality at it is best happened on Saturday. He drove up in his Porsche, took us to one of his homes, a hilltop-Japanese-teahouse-inspired home on 14 acres overlooking the bay, to trade for his 'truck' a Tahoe (a BMW Z was stored there too.) Lunch was at his country club and home of the Grand Hotel in Point Clear, a historic 1875 550 acre resort overlooking Mobile Bay. He drove the marathon route laughing all the way over all the hills and ended our full day with lemon custard in an old fashioned ice cream parlor.

On our own we took the trolley tour around town, walked the old fashioned and partially deserted Dauphin Street, and toured the amazing and memorable Mardi Gras Museum where Maricar exited with a huge 5-color boa not only looking very appropriate for her but useful in her chemistry class. I begged her to not wear it to the airport. The night I arrived and was alone I had walked the town, criss-crossing the streets, and came to the conclusion that it was a mixture of new and old, confused about if the town was in recession or growing, and quite the hodge-podge. The old buildings are reminders of the many wrought iron balcony buildings in New Orleans. Did you know that the Mardi Gras originated in Mobile? That individuals pay for the costumes, floats, balls, etc. in Mobile whereas its sponsors in New Orleans?

A lovely old historical hotel is the Battle House where Andrew Jackson held court. Parks and memorials abound as well as there being a recreated waterside fort. The night I arrived one of the museums were in full regalia with pirate costumes and ball starting and I was sort of sorry to have already eaten or I might have indulged in their \$35 event. There are two large cruise ship terminals and a multi decked one had parked waterside our last day, always a surprise to see.

<u>Weather:</u> I'd think one could expect reasonably warm temperatures in Mobile but not so. We were chilled to the bone in 30s temperatures, not reaching over 50, with winds at 13-18mph and didn't warm up until later in the day. It was a rare time that neither of us would venture to an ice bath. We had 3 layers plus hat and gloves and it was a good thing.

<u>Hotel and Food:</u> The Hampton Inn, a brand new facility, was only 2 blocks from the host hotel and 3 blocks to the start line, and even closer to the finish line. The breakfast was better than expected with great egg pizzas plus lots of buffet food including fresh cut fruit. My first night I'd asked all of the info desk, the taxi driver and the hotel clerks where to eat and it was unanimous that I eat at Winschell's Oyster House. We went back Sunday night. The marathon itself fed us well for the pre pasta party and then a full BBQ dinner after the run.

The course: We are at risk of being unbelievable since each marathon seems to get hillier than the last. This one might have only been outdone by Atlanta. It was of course a major surprise to be at 9' above sea level in coastal town Mobile and find so many long hills. We were taken through universities and colleges, parks and neighborhoods and never was there a dull moment. Residents and/or fluid stations always had a food selection and always had enough support. The only other 'costume' runners we saw were friends of Charlotte and Tara (from Shamrock, Atlanta and most recently Charlotte NC) in grass skirts and purple wigs. What were they? We loved them. Spectators asked if we were going to wear our Lady Liberty hats the whole way, why were we wearing it, were we from New York, and/or what was it. It gives us exactly what we want – attention and ability to be found.

<u>Schedule:</u> I would have liked to stay a couple days as there was plenty more to see and the weather had warmed up. Alas, I was to get home for a short two days before heading to see my parents in K.C. as they have both been in and out of the hospital and are worrying me that they may have used up their 9-lives each.

Diana arrived around 4pm and Maricar came in at 9pm, meeting up at the hotel. Shuttles available from airport to hotel for \$18 but not between 3-5pm without reservations. (True, they close down!) Taxi is set price of \$35.

Expo, registration and package pick up at Radisson Admiral Semmes Hotel – Saturday only Technical shirt to 1st 1500 who register. Careful – they had numerous colors and styles and the race bag didn't have the size requested.

Free pasta party next door to host hotel in huge atrium.

7:30am Bank Trust First Light Marathon (3) start and finish near to hotel

Early entry was only \$32 with 50-state club. www.firstlightmarathon.com

No chip, no banners, just start and go!

Post race meal of BBQ sandwich, slaw, pasta salad was good but scanty as I think they were worried about running out.
