## **Tour highlights:**

Frederick Church's Masterpiece, Olana State Historic Site - Tour of Historic Landscape, Main House & Sharp Gallery

Frederick Edwin Church, landscape painter and member of the Hudson River School was a midnineteenth century celebrity. The 250 acre estate features an elaborately stenciled Persian inspired mansion designed by architect Calvert Vaux (co-designer Central Park, Grand Army Plaza, Museum of Natural History). Olana is filled with original sketches, studies and paintings by one of the mid-19th century's most famous artists. A diverse decorative arts collection includes objects from around the world. The property is developed in much the way Church created his canvasses with strategically revealed vistas of one of the most strikingly beautiful places in the Hudson Valley. We'll break mid day in the farm area of Olana for a delicious and refreshing lunch in the Wagon House. Comfortable shoes necessary - guided walk is about one mile in length and one hour in duration. End.
